January Meeting - Thursday, Jan. 25 Igneous Rock Types: A Primer by Paul Hlava

Most people only know a few rock names and often confuse the situation by using one name for a wide variety of rock types. For example, sellers of stone tile and countertops use the term GRANITE for any coarse grained, silicate rock. That's OK for them but I figure that members of gem and mineral clubs should know a bit more than that.

This presentation will introduce you to the names of the common (and some uncommon) igneous rock types. The discussions will proceed along the path that nature has assigned to them - from high temperature, dark-colored rocks, rich in iron, magnesium, and calcium, to low temperature, light-colored rocks, rich in sodium, potassium and aluminum.

Along the way you will learn a bunch of great geologic terms (with which you can amaze folks at cocktail parties), meet rock types that we have here in New Mexico, and learn a few cultural things that make life interesting and spice up this dull, boring talk!

Biography:

From 1974 to 2007, Paul Hlava worked in the electron microprobe laboratory (as staff member in charge of the lab from 1980 on) at Sandia National Laboratories in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Because the EMP lab is part of the Materials Characterization Department, a centralized analytical facility for Sandia, Paul got to work on a wide variety of (prosaic to exotic) materials and projects. He normally analyzed many alloys and joins (welds, brazes, solders, metal to ceramic, glass/metal seals, etc.) but also did work on high tech ceramics, low-temperature superconductors, electronic materials, phosphors, contamination, corrosion, failure analyses, nuclear waste simulants, et hoc genus omne. As a result, he has written, co-authored, and/or presented about a hundred papers on a wide variety of materials.

Paul graduated from the University of New Mexico with a geology MS in 1974. At UNM he worked as a research graduate doing probe research under Klaus Keil in the Institute of Meteoritics. He worked on moon rocks, Hawaiian basalts, ultramafic rocks, meteorites, and inclusions in diamonds. Paul occasionally used his geological and mineralogical expertise on Sandia projects but also did some personal research on minerals. He has been codiscoverer and co-author on the descriptions of several new mineral species.

Paul stays active in the area of geology, mineralogy, crystallography, and gemology. He was president of the Albuquerque Gem and Mineral Club, and he is the geological/mineralogical expert for the New Mexico Facetors Guild, and often gives talks on geological/mineralogical/ crystallographic subjects. In 1988, Paul started a side business, Access to Gems and Minerals, Inc., dealing in gemstones, jewelry, and related items. This has not only given him access to wholesale rooms full of gemstones but it has piqued his interest in the research side of this field. He has given several well-received talks on gem related subjects.

January Field Trip Report

On Saturday January 6 2024, nineteen AGMC members drove from the cold gray morning weather of Albuquerque to to to the relatively balmy (mid-40's) sunny weather of Socorro. Perfect weather for mineral collecting at the lower mines of Socorro Peak. These mines are century old silver mines on the private and secure property of EMRTC/ New Mexico Tech. However, AGMC was able to arrange special permission to mineral collect at the mines. Our helpful host was Mr. Michael Stanley, who represented EMRTC.

The collectable minerals are predominantly micros of high quality, requiring magnification for full appreciation. Members working the dumps of the Merritt-Silver Bar mines were rewarded with large amounts of micro minerals including barite, jarosite, goethite, aurichalcite, willemite, bromargyrite, and hemimorphite. Scott Braley, Pat Haynes, Jim Hill, and other micro collectors were seen filling up beer flats and cloth bags with vuggy barite -calcite rock full of micro crystals. We all know what they will be doing this winter! In addition, Pat Haynes and I each collected vuggy rock containing green crystallized and waxy globular bromargyrite (silver ore mineral), in amounts easily visible to the naked eye, which is unusual for the locality.

Overall, a fun and rewarding collecting day was had by all, and hopefully AGMC will be able to re-visit this classic location again next winter.

TOTE Silent Auction – How to Rent a Table

Interested in auctioning your extra rocks and minerals? Here's how the TOTE silent auction works:

- There are a dozen tables at the auction, divided into **club** and **private** tables.
- At **club** tables, donated specimens are auctioned off with proceeds going to the club.
- At **private** tables, club members pay a fee to rent the table per auction. Members auction their own specimens with proceeds going directly to them.
- · During the three days of the show, there are three auctions per day, making nine total auctions.
- The charge to rent a private table is \$20 per auction. Club members can rent a table(s) at any number of auctions, based on availability. Auction co-leaders will have final say on rentals.
- As a silent auction, buyers write bids on bid sheets while the auction period is open. The winner is the highest bidder when the table is closed.

If you would like to rent a table during an auction, contact the auction co-leads Doug or Tom at silentauction@agmc.info. Rentals will be first-come, first-served. An acknowledgement email secures your spot. Rental fees are paid on the day of the auction.

The largest show in America, and possibly the world, will be starting in Tucson Arizona later this month. Many of you are regular visitors to this event, but I will share some information for the rest of the club.

The "Tucson Gem, Mineral & Fossil Showcase" is made up of 47 different sales locations with about 4000 companies represented. Published dates are January 24 - February 11, but each location sets its own dates. (These numbers come from XPoPress, which publishes an annual guide to all the shows.)

Now these locations range from small buildings with just a handful of dealers to massive outdoor and indoor locations. Most shows specialize - minerals only, fossils only, gems and jewelry, beads, equipment and of course a few flea markets. Each location has their own qualifications for entry, many are open to the public, but some do require a sales tax license for wholesale purchases. Most offer free admission, with the exception of the club-sponsored show that takes place from Thursday to Sunday of the final weekend.

All this means that if you are planning to attend for the first time, you will want to do some research before you head west. You can find information sources online. XPoPress.com is a great place to start, and provides links to each of the shows, as well as comprehensive dealer lists. Be prepared for parking problems and elevated prices in hotels and restaurants.

I intend to visit this year for the first time since 2019, and I am excited to see all the changes that have occurred since then. Will you be going?
