March Meeting -- Live Presentation!

*What's new in minerals in Colorado, New Mexico,
Utah, California, and Arizona*

*as presented at the Rochester Mineralogical Symposium:
the Covid years – 2020 to 2023*

At the beginning of March 2020, the spread of Covid across the United States caused numerous social and educational organizations to cancel meetings. The Rochester Mineral Symposium in Rochester, New York had been held for more than 45 years in the middle of April at a motel just south of the Rochester airport. This 4-day meeting traditionally had several presentations on “what’s new in minerals” for that year, with input from the audience on those discoveries or the surfacing of older discoveries that people had never seen. Attendance at this symposium numbered between 200 and 300 mineralogists, scientists and collectors who lived in the nearby states of the United States and provinces of Canada.

With the arrival of Covid, the on-site symposium was canceled and converted to a series of Zoom internet presentations. The following years of 2021 and 2022 were similarly converted to Zoom symposia. Although Covid was no longer a threat by April 2023, the motel where the symposium was held had changed ownership and refused to make the motel available. A search for a financially affordable venue failed and the final Rochester Mineral Symposium was held via Zoom in April 2023, thus ending the largest and most well-known symposia on the East Coast after 50 years.

This in-person talk summarizes the “What’s new in minerals” presentations that were given remotely by the author with a few post April 2023 discoveries of significance. The discoveries include some of the best topaz, phenakite, aquamarine, and helvite on Mount Antero, Colorado; bertrandite and phenakite from Crystal Peak, Colorado; fluorite from Specimen Rock area, Colorado; rhodochrosite from the Sara Rose mine, Alma, Colorado; green calcite from Garfield county, Utah; fluorite, emeralds, feldspar pseudomorphs, calcite pseudomorphs, and smithsonite from New Mexico; topaz from Arizona; sand calcite from Wyoming; and pink elbaite from southern California.

About the Speaker

Mark Ivan Jacobson is a geologist-mineralogist specializing in pegmatites. He obtained a BS in mineralogy-geochemistry from Pennsylvania State University in 1973 and a MS in sedimentary geology from the University of California at Berkeley in 1976. After graduate school, he worked for Amoco and Chevron in oil and gas development as an earth scientist, completing 35 years with Chevron before retiring in 2013. He has published numerous articles on the geology, mineralogy, and mining-collecting histories of pegmatites since 1978 as well as three major books: “The Gems of Hiddenite, North Carolina: Mining History, Geology, and Mineralogy” (2021), “Guidebook to the pegmatites of Western Australia (2007)”, and “Antero Aquamarines: Minerals from the Mount Antero - White Mountain region, Chaffee County, Colorado (1993).” He has been a consulting editor for *Rocks & Minerals* since 1984. He has been a member of Friends of Mineralogy - Colorado Chapter since 1982 and was FM National president (2021-2023).

Feb. 17 -- Artesia for Pecos Diamonds

Lora McKown & I, Denise Barrett, volunteered to lead this trip in Grant's absence this month. I did not want to see this trip cancelled and had been looking sooooo forward to this as I had never been there and could not wait to see what it was all about. Dean, Grant, Doug and Lora all contributed in teaching me the ropes of leading a group and giving me the information for our search. I hope in the future, if events are in need of a leader, that other members would also step up and help. The trips are one of the best parts of this club! Everybody wants to spend a day digging in the dirt or walking around like zombies to find their own pretty rocks.

On Saturday, February 17th, 16 brave, die-hard Rockhounds faced freezing fog and icy road conditions driving down to Artesia, NM, in search of Pecos Diamonds. Lora and I caravanned, leaving at O'dark thirty, so that we could spend some time ogling in a couple of rock shops downtown. We didn't have as much time as we wanted in the shops because we had to keep stopping to scrape the ice off our windshields and wiper blades. The Rock Shops we stopped at were very different from each other. The first shop, "Ancients of Days," displays mostly a wide variety of raw materials, fossils and Christian Supplies. Don also had pre-cut slabs for purchase. The other store near by, "Eclectic Treasurez" had the beautifully polished rocks sorted by color! Right on cue at 12:30pm, we all met at Eagle Draw Park in Artesia. 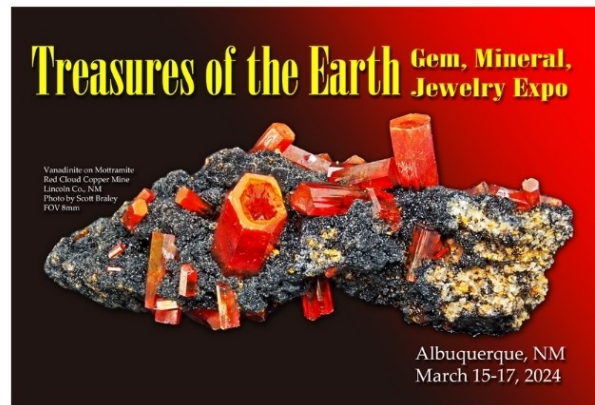

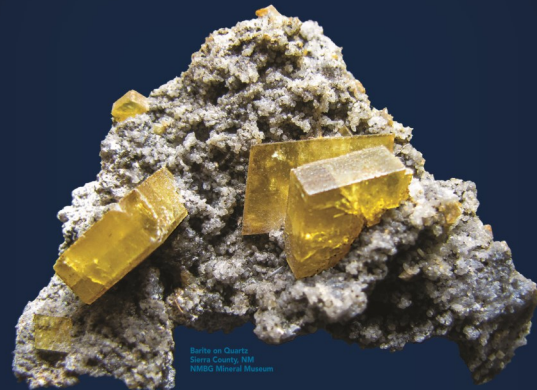
REFRESHMENTS COORDINATOR

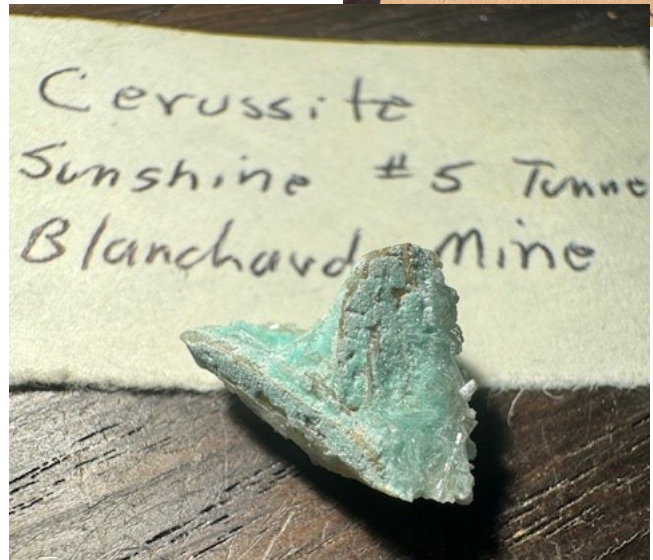
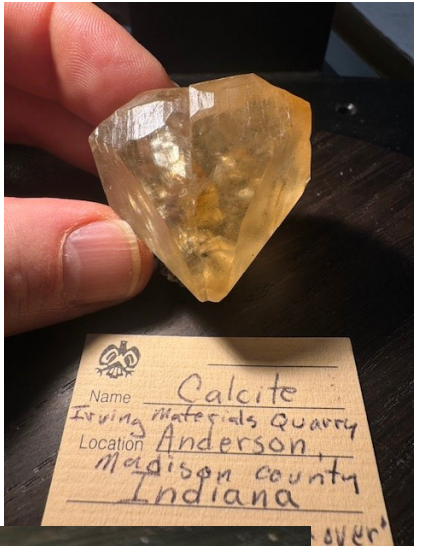
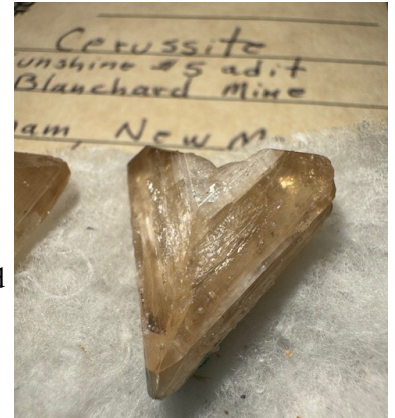
